SUSLA'S DENTAL HYGIENE GRADS ARE PERFECT

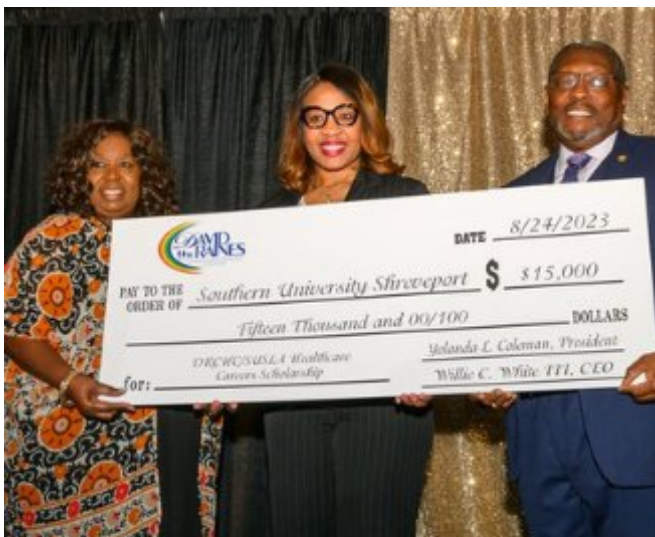


The Southern University at Shreveport May 2023 Dental Hygiene graduates achieved a 100% pass rate on their national and regional examinations.

SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY'S JAGUAR SCHOLARS PROGRAM

Jaguar Scholars is a Department of Labor-funded program that launched here at Southern University at Shreveport. The Jaguar Scholars program was a Job Corp pilot program that was implemented on campus in June 2020. With our community in mind, the program provided youth and young adults options relating to education. The Jaguar Scholars program was intentional in providing youth and young adults the opportunity to attain a certification in twelve months or less in a high-demand field. The Jaguar Scholars program offered a plethora of certifications ranging from computer networking to phlebotomy. In addition, the Jaguar Scholars program was a pathway for students who attended the HiSET program housed at the Metro campus location. Once students completed their HiSET exams, they were given the option to apply for the Jaguar Scholars program to pursue a certification in a desired field.

Xondria Sullivan completed the Jaguar Scholars program in 2022 and received a certification in Emergency Medical Technician-Basic.



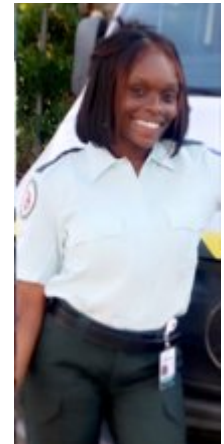

Therefore, it is important that the accomplishments of the Jaguar Scholars participants are acknowledged and celebrated. Many students have completed the Southern University Jaguar Scholars program and have gone on to receive their certifications. Some have already become productive working citizens in our communities, and others have returned to further their education at Southern University. 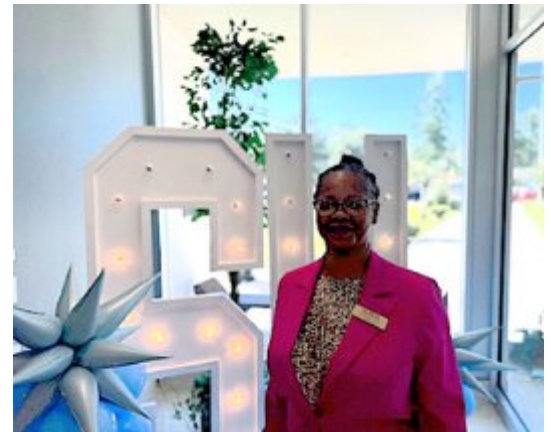

SUSLA TEAM ATTENDS NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION HI-TEC CONFERENCE

The Department Head of Engineering & Technology, Dr. Kenie Moses, and Director of Sponsored Programs, Ms. Stephanie Graham, traveled to Atlanta GA and participated in the first, in-person, week-long National Science Foundation (NSF) High Impact Technology Exchange Conference (HI-TEC) since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2020, SUSLA submitted an NSF proposal titled, "Building a Career Pathway from High School into the Workforce for Skilled Technicians in Electrical, Industrial, and Process Engineering Technology " which was awarded in 2021 for \$299, 800. The grant award has helped to facilitate the development and implementation of SUSLA's Engineering Technology A.A.S. degree program as well as provided funding for marketing and recruitment of the program.



The "Building a Career Pathway from High School into the Workforce for Skilled Technicians in Electrical, Industrial, and Process Engineering Technology " is a project whose overarching goal is to advance technician education by developing and implementing a three-pronged Associate of Applied Science degree in Engineering Technology that can strengthen the workforce pipeline of diverse, skilled graduates to meet Northwest Louisiana's workforce needs.

CONCLUSION

The 2+2 matriculation model provides a clear pathway for students to complete their degree in a shorter time frame and at a lower cost. This model is particularly beneficial for students who are first-generation college students or who are from low-income backgrounds. By providing a clear pathway to a four-year degree, the 2+2 model can help to reduce the barriers to higher education and to increase the economic mobility of students.

Additionally, Dr. Moses presented a poster session at HI-TEC titled "Providing Equitable Access to Technician Education Through The 2+2 Matriculation Model." The poster session detailed SUSLA's Engineering Technology degree program, as well as the methodology for high school student, dual-enrollment into the certificate of technical studies in Engineering.

SUSLA PARTNERS WITH JARVIS CHRISTIAN UNIVERSITY FOR NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION GRANT AWARD

Jarvis Christian University and Southern University at Shreveport was recently awarded a National Science Foundation, (NSF) Historically Black College and University Undergraduate Program (HBCU-UP) grant in the amount of \$2,249,695 for a period of five years beginning 2023. The grant focuses on the establishment of an interdisciplinary STEM research and education center at Jarvis for biology, chemistry, mathematics, physics, and engineering focusing on interdisciplinary research and education in physical (mathematics and chemistry) and life sciences (biology and health sciences). Creation of the ISREC will promote and enhance interdisciplinary research opportunities for STEM students and faculty from Jarvis and partner institutions, promoting collaboration and advancing STEM knowledge.



In promoting collaboration, Jarvis and SUSLA will create a Summer STEM Bridge program that will allow students from SUSLA to participate in research at Jarvis. There are two plans of operation for the Summer STEM Program between SUSLA and Jarvis Christian University. 1) Jarvis Christian University High School Bridge Program will host a total of (50) fifty high school students to their Summer Bridge program for a duration of (4) weeks with a stipend of \$500 per week provided to the students. In addition, Room and Board will be provided by Jarvis Christian University on their campus site. Up to (20) twenty of the (50) high school students chosen for the Summer program will be students from SUSLA's service area.



During the 4-week Summer program, Dr. Kenie Moses will travel to Jarvis to host an "Engineering Week" during the Summer program. Potential topics of the "Engineering Week" can include: Engineering and Technology Careers of the Future, Electronics and Solar Photovoltaic (Renewable Energy), Fly Like a Drone and Master Aerial Videography, Exploring Robotics and Drone Programming. 2) Jarvis Christian University Undergraduate Research Program will host a total of (10) post-secondary students for an 8-week research internship with a stipend of \$1000 per week provided to the students. In addition, Room and Board will be provided by Jarvis Christian University on their campus site. Up to (2) two of SUSLA's undergraduate students will be chosen to participate in the 8-week research internship that can cover research topics such as: Mathematical modeling for cancer growth and treatments, Nanotechnology, Inhibitory effects of bioactive compounds or nanoparticles on cancer development and treatment, investigatory impact of students who participated in research and other STEM opportunities, and students' test anxiety and mitigation. The program will accept all STEM disciplines and anticipate that students participating in the program will enroll at Jarvis Christian University for undergraduate studies or transfer from SUSLA to continue their pursuit of their 4-year degree.

SUSLA RECEIVES CENTERPOINT ENERGY FOUNDATION GRANT AWARD FOR 2023



CONGRATULATIONS to Dr. Kenie Moses, Department Head, Engineering & Technology and Mr. Ted Scott, Director, Williams Center of Undergraduate Achievement, for their successful award of the CenterPoint Energy Foundation grant titled “No Student Left Behind: Mentorship and STEM Career Guidance Through the Williams Center and the STEM Enrichment Academy.” The award was issued to Southern University at Shreveport in July 2023 in the amount of \$30,000.



The “No Student Left Behind”; Project will address unmet needs in underrepresented populations and early engagement of critical math and science concepts related to problem-solving, students; STEM self-efficacy and their awareness of area opportunities in STEM fields. Furthermore, the “No Student Left Behind”; Project may increase low participation numbers of women and minorities in engineering and technical programs. In addition, early engagement now can mean an increase in middle-skilled workers, increasing pipeline of skilled technical workers.

LSBDC Offers Training During Black Music Month

August was Black Business Month! During this month, Southern University at Shreveport’s Small Business Development Center (SUSLA SBDC) partnered with the Shreveport-Bossier African American Chamber of Commerce to host a training entitled “Marketing Your Business To Government Agencies and Prime Contractors.” The event was held on August 24 at the Milam Street Kitchen Incubator and Community Kitchen (MS KICK) in Shreveport from 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM. The event targeted to small business owners seeking vending opportunities. Over thirty (30) people were in attendance.



During the event, representatives from the Fair Share program was on hand to talk about bid processes and opportunities. The facilitator for the training was Jennifer Whittington, Contract Specialist with NWLA APEX. The participants were given information on government purchasing guidelines, proven marketing strategies, optimizing profiles, market research, capabilities statements and more.
