

AVIATION MAINTENANCE PROGRAM PARTICIPATES IN THE JACK & JILL OF AMERICA PROGRAM





Founded in Philadelphia, PA in 1938, Jack & Jill of America is the oldest African American family organization. We are comprised of approximately 10, 000 families in 220 communities around the country. The core of the Jack & Jill of America philosophy is that every child — if given the proper guidance and opportunity — can be developed into a leader. It is this commitment to youth that drives the organization. They dedicate their resources to improving the quality of life for children, particularly African American children 2-19 years old.

The Jack & Jill of America objectives and aims are to: to create a medium contact for children which will stimulate growth and development, to provide children a constructive educational, cultural, health, recreational and social program, to aid mothers in learning more about their children by careful study and to see for all children the same advantages which we desire for our own and to support all national legislation aimed at bettering the condition of all children. The local programming focuses on leadership development, healthy living, civic responsibility, financial literacy, STEAM (Science, Technology, Education, Arts and Math) and community service. Locally, we work with the Boys & Girls Club, Providence House, Susan G. Komen, March of Dimes, and the Lupus Foundation to name a few. Jack & Jill of America has had a presence in the greater Shreveport/Bossier area since the 1980s. Currently, the Red River Chapter is comprised of families from Caddo, Bossier, Webster, DeSoto, Red River & Bienville parishes.



SUSLA'S FISCAL YEAR 2022-2023 CAPITAL OUTLAY REQUEST TOTALS \$30M: \$9M FOR A NEW HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION BUILDING/GYMNASIUM AND \$20M FOR A NEW WORKFORCE TRAINING AND TECHNOLOGY CENTER





A key priority of SUSLA's Interim Chancellor Dr. Vladimir A. Appeaning's administration is strengthening the institution's physical plant – facilities and infrastructure. During his initial meeting with campus stakeholders in November 2021, Dr. Appeaning discovered, during his extended meetings with the student leaders, that SUSLA's Gymnasium/Health and Physical Education Building had been shut down for almost three (3) years due to mold issues. After conferring with state officials, Dr. Appeaning was informed that the current SUSLA Gymnasium that was dedicated in 1999 by then Louisiana Governor MJ "Mike" Foster was scheduled for demolition in late summer/fall of 2022 with no prospect of a replacement building.


Dr. Appeaning and his administration went to work immediately working closely with the Southern University System's Facilities Team led by Mr. Maurice Pitts and Mr. Ken Dawson, with support from Dr. Ray L. Belton, President-Chancellor for the Southern University System; as well as staff from the Louisiana Board of Regents and Division of Administration.

As a result, two (2) SUSLA Capital Outlay Facilities Projects were prepared, submitted, approved and loaded into the state's ECORTS system for Fiscal Year 2022-2023.

- The Capital Outlay Request for a New Gymnasium/Health and Physical Education Building totals \$9 Million with construction costs estimated at \$7.5 Million assigned State Project ID Number: 568510.
- The Capital Outlay Request for a New Workforce Training and Technology totals \$21 Million with construction costs estimated at \$17.6 Million assigned State Project ID Number: 568501.

Combined, both SUSLA Capital Outlay requests total \$30 Million, are supported by Senator Gregory Tarver, and are under consideration by the Louisiana Legislature in the 2022 Regular Legislative Session.

American Heart Association Historically Black Colleges and Universities Scholars Program Research Symposium. SUSLA student Victor L. Thomas successfully participated in the 2021-2022 program.

Victor Thomas is a second-year psychology major at Southern University at Shreveport. He participated in a year-long American Heart Association Scholars Program for HBCUs. The Community Foundation of Northwest Louisiana sponsored a stipend for Thomas' participation in the program.

As an American Heart Association HBCU scholar, Victor has worked under the mentorship of Dr. Steven R. Bailey (LSU Medical School), investigating "Social Isolation & Loneliness as Risk Factors in Cardiovascular Disease." Victor shared his research at the annual symposium held in Nashville, Tennessee, along with scholars from across the south, including two scholars from Southern Baton Rouge. Upon graduation, Victor hopes to pursue a career in clinical psychology.

The Associate of Applied Science degree in Engineering Technology with a concentration in Process Technology (PTEC) is funded by the U.S. Department of Energy with the aim of educating the next generation of technicians and operators for process industries in Louisiana and abroad. This program is housed on the Baton Rouge campus of Southern University and A&M College. The first cohort has been admitted in Spring 2022 semester, and there are currently six students enrolled in the program. To serve the educational objectives of this program, several lab instruments were purchased for \$210,000, of which a number has been delivered and other equipment is due for delivery by Summer 2022. In addition, five licenses of a virtual reality (VR) training software has been acquired for \$6,375.

The PTEC program has also received a \$10,000 grant from ExxonMobil which will be used for purchasing additional VR training software. This grant supports the education and workforce development initiatives of the university, and aims to fund a virtual reality lab for the PTEC program concentration. E-Learning is an essential tool in complementing physical labs and assisting in conceptual learning experiences. Digitally enhanced VR or augmented reality software and associated equipment is an advanced form of virtual learning setups that enable students to experience real-life working conditions and hands-on activity in a plant-like virtual environment. With this grant, a virtual reality simulator with an outside operator view will be purchased that enable students to exercise various functions of pumps and valves and troubleshoot the associate problems.

Southern University and A&M College and its Department of Engineering provides significant assistance and collaboration for SUSLA's Department of Engineering & Technology's PTEC program concentration to succeed in endorsement and accreditation efforts where educational facilities and learning outcomes are assessed. We are also grateful for having a supportive industry advisory committee, of which ExxonMobil is a member and actively contributes to the success of the program.







SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY AT SHREVEPORT EXPANDS THEIR PARTNERSHIPS IN THE CITY OF SHREVEPORT

A key focus of SUSLA's Interim Chancellor Dr. Vladimir A. Appeaning's administration is strengthening and expanding partnerships with local appointed and elected officials in the City of Shreveport. On March 15, 2022, Dr. Appeaning met with the City of Shreveport's Chief of Police, Wayne Smith and his senior administrative team to discuss ways to further strengthen the existing partnership between the City's Police Department and the University's Police Department. As an outcome of the meeting, Chief Wayne Smith pledged to donate several vehicles to the University's Police Department.

SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY AT SHREVEPORT JOINS COHORT 2 OF THE LEARNER SUCCESS LAB

Beginning October 2021, Southern University at Shreveport (SUSLA), under the direction of former Chancellor Dr. Rodney Ellis and Vice-Chancellor Dr. Terry Kidd, joined Cohort 2 of the Learner Success Lab (LSL) conducted by the American Council on Education (ACE). The LSL guides colleges and universities through a structured strategic planning process to advance critical institutional priorities around learner success, with a particular focus on post-traditional and marginalized learner populations. The LSL model integrates higher education experiences and academic credentials with workforce-ready skills to support continuous learning and promote impactful life and



career experiences for students. ACE has paired SUSLA with a lab advisor Dr. Annette Parker, President of South Central College, who will assist in preparing the institution's LSL Committee and lead an assessment of existing learner success activities and initiatives. The core of ACE's Learner Success Model comprises Career Readiness, Life Design, and Completion.

SUSLA's Leadership Team is Dr. Lonnie McCray, Dr. Wanda Waller, Dr. Devonye Brown, and Mr. Fred Moss. The ACE Learner Lab focuses on comprehensive institutional transformation via a self-assessment and planning process designed to improve retention, persistence, and completion. Its overall mission is fully aligned with our QEP and strategic plan. Moreover, the transformation includes enhancing the perceived relevancy of our institution to career and lifelong expectations of current and prospective students.

The LSL Committee is reviewing ways to institute Guided Pathways throughout the university's programs, policies, and processes.

Drs. McCray and Brown recently attended Milestone Meeting 2: Data Collection and Analysis on March 18, 2022. This was a hybrid meeting held in Washington, D.C. In addition to data collection and analysis, the conference focused on Carnegie Classifications, Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, Agility and Transformation, and Self-Assessment.

- · Understand the plans for individuals with disabilities
